Tony Guerin is the worthy recipient of the 2025 John B. Keane Lifetime Achievement Award for 'his masterful literary insights and his distinctive, honest portrayal of life in Ireland as it was and is'. A playwright, novelist and former Kerry footballer, Tony has penned several plays including Cuckoo Blue, Solo Run, Hummin', The Laird of Doon and a novel entitled Tomorrow is a lovely day. Tony's latest novel Quilt is a patchwork of disparate and connected stories and will be launched at this year's festival.

11.00^{am} Knight of Kerry, Sir Adrian FitzGerald - Disillusioned Unionist & Rejected Emancipationist The Papers of Maurice FitzGerald Volumes I and II

Sir Adrian Fitzgerald, the 24th Knight of Kerry is the last hereditary Knight in Ireland. Also called the Green Knight, the Knight of Kerry is one of three Anglo-Irish hereditary knighthoods which existed in Ireland since feudal times. He presents the papers of his ancestor Maurice Fitzgerald (1772-1849), the 18th Knight of Kerry.

Maurice Fitzgerald was from Ballinruddery, a few miles east of Listowel and following the death of his father in 1781, Maurice and his brother and sister were brought up by their widowed mother, Catherine. He studied at Trinity College Dublin and Lincoln's Inn, but preferred the lure of politics to the practice of law. He developed the huge slate quarry on Valentia Island and regularly returned to Ballinruddery in North Kerry during his 35 years as a member of the College Green and Westminster parliaments.

Seán Ronayne is a Cork-born ornithologist, wildlife sound-recordist, award-winning author, and environmental activist who has spent a life immersed in nature. Following a childhood spent exploring the fields and woods of his hometown, he secured his first professional ornithology job in 2017, and in 2018 he moved to Barcelona with his partner Alba, a Catalan native, where he began recording birds and wildlife in earnest.

Upon returning to Ireland in 2021, he embarked on a mission to document the vocalisations of every Irish bird species, a daunting task revealing the precarious state of Irish ecology. He has now just three species left to record, out of almost 200, and has amassed a collection of over 12,000 recordings of Irish birds and other wildlife. His first book Nature Boy, won Irish Biography of the Year, and was also shortlisted for overall Irish Book of the Year. He is currently writing his second book.

Poetry: RITA ANN HIGGINS at 70 with Moya Cannon and Victoria Kennefick A special event celebrating decades of wonderful writing by poet Rita Ann Higgins with readings of her work from award winning poets Victoria Kennefick and Moya Cannon and moderated by Gabriel Fitzmaurice.

Born in Galway, Rita Ann Higgins was one of 13 children in her family and left school at the age of 14, she began to write poetry in her twenties after being hospitalised with TB. She has published twelve books of poetry and prose, including *Sunny Side Plucked*, *An Awful Racket*, *Throw in the Vowels: New & Selected Poems, Ireland Is Changing Mother* and *Tongulish*.

Rita Ann's frank, wry poems often look squarely at economic and gender-based inequalities. Calling hers a "smart, sassy, unabashed, female working class voice in Irish writing" in a 2011 Irish Times review of *Ireland Is Changing Mother*, Fintan O'Toole observes that "the anger in her work is transmuted into invention and absurdity, and it rubs shoulders with other deliciously deadly sins, like lust and pride."

The first of a dozen poetry books by Rita Ann was published in 1986. Her work captures her as a gutsy, anarchic chronicler of Irish lives and foibles. In 2026 Bloodaxe will publish her *Collected Poems* to mark her 70th birthday. In 2021 she received The Living Poets Society Award. She was shortlisted for The Ireland Professor of Poetry in 2022 and is a member of Aosdána.

Moya Cannon won the Brendan Behan Award for the best first collection of poetry in 1990 for *Oar* and Victoria Kennefick's debut collection, *Eat or We Both Starve*, won the Seamus Heaney First Collection Poetry Prize and the Dalkey Book Festival Emerging Writer of the Year Award.
